How to Tell if You Have a Cold or the Flu

It's that time of year again: hacking cough, drippy nose and a fever.

How do you know if that tickle in the back of your throat is the symptom of a cold or a sign that you're about to come down with the flu? And is it the seasonal flu or the H1N1 flu?

Check out this list of symptoms from the **Federal Citizen Information Center** and the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and the FDA's Office of Women's Health to help answer your question.

Do you have...

A fever? It might be the flu: Fevers are rare with common colds, but almost always accompany the flu.

A sore throat? It might be a cold: It's normal to have a sore throat with a cold, but less likely with the flu.

A headache? It might be the flu: Rare with a cold, common with the flu.

Achiness? It might be the flu: Mild aches can sometimes be signs of a cold. Severe aches are a good indicator of the flu.

Exhaustion? It might be the flu: Not likely with a cold, almost always with the flu.

A stuffy nose? It might be a cold: Very likely to be the symptom of a cold, but can occasionally be associated with the flu.

If your symptoms tend to fall more on the cold side of the spectrum, your best bet is to get lots of rest and fluids. You should start to feel better in a few days. If your symptoms are more flu-like, head to the doctor, who can determine the best form of treatment and test whether it's H1N1 or the seasonal flu.

Schokoladen Flieger

On Nov. 14th of this year I attended an address by Col. Gail Halverson (ret), the Candy Bomber of the Berlin Airlift. In his talk he mentioned ground control units in the American Zone of occupied Germany and in Berlin at Tempelhof airfield.

I was with the 601st Tactical Control Squadron from June, 1946 to Oct. or Nov. 1948 and was a string puller and scope dope at our radar site which traced airlift aircraft through the twenty mile corridor to Berlin.

After the Colonel finished his talk, I approached him and when I got a chance to speak asked him how many flights he took in Tempelhof. About 140, he replied.

Then I asked, "Does the name Gunpost ring a bell?" He jerked back. Clapped his hand to his head, and said, "Gunpost, you guys saved a lot of us."

The job of the Gunpost crews was to keep the Gooney Birds (C47s) and the later C54s centered in the corridor, away from the edges which were being patrolled by Soviet Yak fighter planes.

In just about everything I have been reading about the Berlin Airlift there is mention of ground control at the start and end of the Airlift carriers. But I have found nothing about the tactical control work of the Gunpost crews of the 601st Tactical Control Squadron. I hope this provides a little more information about their important work.

Incidentally Col. Halverson signed a copy of his book, "The Berlin Candy Bomber" It is a good read and I heartily recommend it to anyone interested in the Airlift saga. For me it was very nostalgic.

Halverson started the candy parachutes with two sticks of gum that he broke in half and handed to four kids standing at a Tempelhof fence. That led him to the idea of fashioning small parachutes of handkerchiefs and small bits of cloth and dropping chocolate bars, lollipops, gum and other candies to children who often gathered under the flight path of the approaches to the airfield.

When talking to a group of the German children he was told they didn't know which of the planes (one came in every three minutes) was his. He said he would wiggle his wings as he approached. That led to one of his nicknames Onkle Wackelflugel (wiggly wings). Other nicknames were Schokoladen Flieger, Schokoladen Soldaten and one I remember, lollipop soldaten.

Best wishes to all you guys and gals who like me were in the U.S. Army Air Force and then (late in 1948) in the United States Air Force.

REUNION2010

I am still working on the Agenda for the 2010 Reunion in Santa Fe. However here are some highlights of the agenda.

On Tuesday, April 27, 2010, a "Destination Southwest" tour guide and deluxe motor coach will meet you at the Courtyard by Marriot. We will take a driving tour of Santa Fe, the capital of New Mexico.

We will continue on to the Plaza for an 'optional walking tour' and group picture taking session. Our tour will take us to such points of interest as the historic Plaza, St. Francis Cathedral, the Loretto Chapel, with its famous "miraculous" staircase, and the San Miguel Mission.

Founded in 1610, Santa Fe was the last stop on the Camino Real, the fabled Royal Road that stretched from Mexico City to the northernmost reaches of the Spanish Empire. Today it is the heart and soul of the Southwest and "Santa Fe Style" is synonymous with all the best the region has to offer. Its historic Plaza, winding streets, covered arcades, hidden gardens and courtyards, and Pueblo style architecture reflect the blending of Indian, Hispanic, and Anglo cultures. Our members will be able take the free shuttle from the hotel to their own points of interest.

On Wednesday, April 28, 2010, we will have a guided tour to the surrounding area, starting at 10:00 AM and ending at 6:00 PM. Our tour will cover the historic village of Chimayo, which dates from the seventeenth century.

Its most famous landmark is a venerable religious shrine, the Santuario de Chimayo. Don Bernardo de Abeyta erected this beautiful adobe chapel with twin bell towers in 1816 over sand that is said to have miraculous healing qualities. The weavers of Chimayo have produced the colorful and decorative Rio Grande Textiles for centuries. We will visit an artisan-weaving workshop and see the weavers at work.

At the Rancho de Chimayo Restaurant, known for its traditional northern New Mexico Cuisine we will enjoy a hosted lunch.

On to Los Alamos, selected by the Federal Government in 1942 as the site of the top-secret Manhattan Project, for a visit to the Bradbury Museum, which is operated by the Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL). At the museum, you will learn how LANL scientists are using the latest technologies to deal with the complex challenges of today's world, including issues of national security, energy, transportation, and commercial applications of military technology.

Arrive in Bandelier National Monument, best known for its mesas, sheer walled canyons, and the ancestral Pueblo dwellings found among them. The Park was designed in 1916 and named for the nineteenth-century anthropologist Adolph Bandelier. Frijoles Canyon is famous for its extensive Anasazi ruins and cliff dwellings that date back to about 1100 AD.

As always, I am trying to keep the price affordable for all of you to enjoy these tours. I am still in the "negotiating stage" to get the best price.

However, this gives you an idea what we will be doing and enjoying during our reunion week. I hope you will be able to join us in Santa Fe for the 2010 Reunion, April 25-30, 2010.

2010 Census Cautions

This information is being distributed by the Dallas / Ft. Worth IBM Organization to warn it's thousands of members of fraud associated with the 2010 Census (some pre-census activity is already underway). However, this warning is for ALL citizens, so you may want to pass it on to everyone you know.

Be Cautious about Giving Info to Census Workers.

With the U.S. Census process beginning, the Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises people to be cooperative, but cautious, so as not to become a victim of fraud or identity theft. The first phase of the 2010 U.S. Census is under way, as workers have begun verifying the addresses of households across the country. Eventually, more than 140,000 U.S. census workers will count every person in the United States and will gather information about every person living at each address including name, age, gender, race, and other relevant data. The big question is - how do you tell the difference between a U.S. Census worker and a con artist? BBB offers the following advice:

****** If a U.S. Census worker knocks on your door, they will have a badge, a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag, and a confidentiality notice. Ask to see their identification and their badge before answering their questions. However, you should **never** invite anyone you do not know into your home.

****** Census workers are currently only knocking on doors to verify address information. **Do not give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone**, even if they claim they need it for the U.S. Census. While the Census Bureau might ask for basic financial information, such as a salary range, it will not ask for Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers, nor will employees solicit donations.

Eventually, Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail, or in person at home. However, they will not contact you by Email, so be on the lookout for Email scams impersonating the Census.

Never click on a link or open any attachments in an Email that seem to be from the U.S. Census Bureau.

Here is one of the dozens of recipes on the site. Santa's Butterscotch Melts Ingredients

As needed melted butter or oil for greasing pans 3 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons soft brown sugar 3/4 cup self-raising flour 1/4 cup custard powder 1 teaspoon water 1 packet chocolate bits

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brush biscuit trays (32x28cm) with melted butter or oil. With electric mixer, beat butter and sugar in the mixing bowl until it is light and creamy. Put in sifted flour and custard powder, stir with wooden spoon, then add water. Stir until it is all mixed well together. Take one teaspoon of mixture and gently roll into a ball - place on biscuit tray - repeat with the remaining mixture. Flatten each ball slightly with a fork. Bake for 15 minutes or until the biscuits are golden brown. Let them cool on trays. To decorate the biscuits, melt a packet of chocolate bits in a bowl in the microwave and dip half of each biscuit into the chocolate. Place in frig for 10 minutes so chocolate will set.
